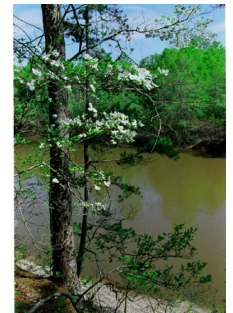

The Neches River

The Neches River flows through Texas history, sustaining the Native American Caddos, the "Texans" who tamed the wilderness, and generations of settlers. Early timber cutters floated rafts of logs down the river to Beaumont.

Today the Neches draws tourists from all over the world. Its flood flows nurture the famed Big Thicket National Preserve, Big Slough and Upland Island Wilderness Areas, the popular Martin Dies, Jr. State Park, two national forests, and the Sabine Lake estuary, a nursery ground for the multi-million-dollar fishing and shrimping industries.

These key wildlife areas abound with deer, squirrels, wood ducks, mallards, colorful songbirds, wild turkey, otters, and a host of other animals. Hikers find rare orchids and spot frogs, turtles, and carnivorous plants. Paddlers experience the thrill of coming upon a doe and fawn or an alligator sunning itself on a downed log.
